I INTRODUCTION TO THE EHF EUROPEAN LEAGUE WOMEN 2023/24

WELCOME TO THE MUST-SEE COMPETITION FOR HANDBALL FANS

Now in its fourth season since the inauguration in 2020, the EHF European League Women has firmly established itself as one of the most appealing handball competitions for fans worldwide. The EHF European League is a must-see competition – in the arenas across the continent, but also at home and online thanks to extensive TV coverage and livestreaming on EHFTV.

The 2022/23 season culminated in Ikast Handbold lifting the trophy at the memorable EHF Finals in Graz. And the competition will return to Austria's second-largest city on 11/12 May 2024 as this season's EHF Finals will be hosted by Graz again. After two qualification rounds in October and November, it is now time for the group phase, which, like in previous seasons, consists of four groups of four teams each. Last season's finalists Nykøbing Falster Håndbold will play in group A, where the Danish side meet Praktiker-Vác, Storhamar Handball Elite, and HC Podravka Vegeta.

Another team that competed at the EHF Finals last season, Thüringer HC, are set to face H.C. Dunarea Braila, the Romanian side that eliminated THC's domestic rivals and last season's third-ranked team, BV Borussia 09 Dortmund, in the last qualification round. Group B further consists of HC Lokomotiva Zagreb and Chambray Touraine Handball.

Neptunes Nantes, the only previous winners taking part in the group phase, were drawn into group C; the French side lifted the trophy in the inaugural edition of the EHF European League in 2020/21. Nantes share their group with CS Gloria 2018 BN, MKS FunFloor Lublin, and a team new to the competition this season: HSG Bensheim/Auerbach.

Finally, group D includes Costa del Sol Malaga, the EHF European Cup Women champions in 2021 and runners-up in 2022, who are set to take on Motherson Mosonmagyaróvári KC, competition debutants CSM Targu Jiu, and Sola HK.

The race to Graz for the EHF Finals Women 2024 is going to be another battle of epic proportions. No wonder the new seasonal campaign for the competition is titled: ALL IN – Greatness is earned.

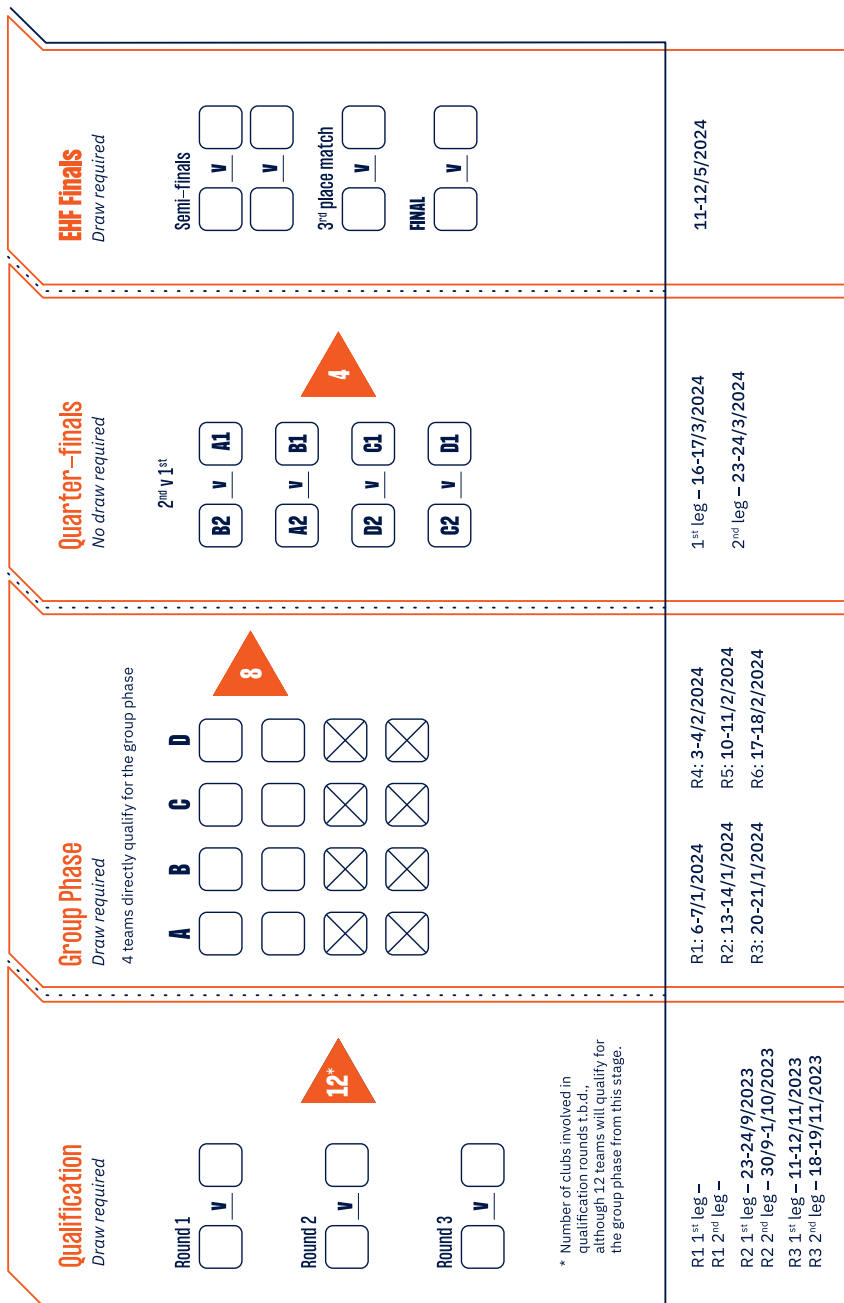

48 MATCHES, 16 TEAMS, 9 NATIONS, 1 FORMER WINNER

FACTS & FIGURES: IMPORTANT NUMBERS BEFORE THE START OF THE GROUP PHASE

After 36 matches in two qualification rounds in October and November 2023 reduced the field to 16 teams, the group phase of the EHF European League Women 2023/24 is ready for throw-off.

Here are the most important Facts & Figures of the competition and its participants:

1 team in the group phase lifted the trophy of the EHF Cup or the Cup Winners' Cup, the two previous second-tier club competitions before the EHF European League started in 2020: MKS FunFloor Lublin won the EHF Cup in 2001.

1 team in the group phase has won the EHF Champions League in the past: HC Podravka Vegeta won Europe's topflight in 1996.

1 goal was the smallest winning margin in qualification round 2, when Sola HK beat Amara Bera Bera 67:66 on aggregate.

1

former winner of the EHF European League is part of the group phase this season: Neptunes Nantes, champions in 2021.

1 player in the group phase has won all major national team titles: Sola HK's Camilla Herrem won the Olympics (2012), World Championship (2011, 2015, 2021), and EHF EURO (2008, 2010, 2014, 2016, 2020) with Norway.

2 participants of the EHF Finals 2023 are part of the 2023/24 group phase: runners-up Nykøbing Falster Håndbold and fourth-placed Thüringer HC; winners Ikast Handbold play in the EHF Champions League, third-placed BV Borussia 09 Dortmund lost in qualification.

2 teams in the group phase are debutants in a European club competition this season: German side HSG Bensheim/Auerbach in group C, and Romanian side CSM Targu Jiu in group D.

2 teams have been part of the group phase in all four seasons of the EHF European League so far: Nantes and Praktiker-Vác.

2 teams that played in the EHF Champions League last season are part of the EHF European League group phase this season: Storhamar Handball Elite and HC Lokomotiva Zagreb.

2

teams have made it all the way from the first qualification round to the group phase: H.C. Dunarea Braila and Costa del Sol Malaga.

2 former EHF Champions League winners were eliminated from the competition in qualification round 1: Hypo Niederösterreich lost against Öttereds HK; Larvik HK against Malaga.

2 group phase participants last season are now playing in the EHF Champions League: Ikast from Denmark and DVSC Schaeffler from Hungary.

3 teams make Romania the best-represented country in the group phase; Croatia, France, Germany, Hungary, and Norway have two teams each; Denmark, Poland, and Spain have one each.

4 teams were seeded for the group phase: the two EHF Finals 2023 participants Nykøbing and THC, and Motherson Mosonmagyaróvári KC and CS Gloria 2018 BN.

6

clubs from six different nations have won the last six editions of the EHF European League / EHF Cup since 2017.

7 teams also played in the group phase last season: Nykøbing, Vác, Podravka, THC, Nantes, Mosonmagyaróvár, and Sola.

9 nations are represented in the group phase, two more than in the 2022/23 season: Croatia, Denmark, France, Germany, Hungary, Norway, Romania and new this season: Poland and Spain.

36

goals was the biggest winning margin in qualification round 2, when Lublin beat Zork Jadodina 80:44 on aggregate.

36 matches were played across two qualification rounds to reduce the number of teams from 34 at the start of the season to 16 for the group phase.

48 group phase matches are scheduled in January and February to find the eight teams who will advance to the quarter-finals in March.

73 was the highest number of goals in a single qualification match, when Nantes beat Molde Elite 45:28 in round 3.

80 was the highest number of goals scored by a team in the two legs of the final qualification round, when Lublin beat Zork 80:44.

2,008 goals were scored in the two qualification rounds: 717 in the 12 matches of the first round, and 1,291 in the 24 matches of the last round, making for an average of 55.77 goals per match.

I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS?

All matches shall be played in accordance with the IHF's current Rules of the Game. Variations on a technical level are possible. All matches of the EHF European League shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

Teams' rankings are obtained by adding up the number of points won.

GROUP PHASE

If two or more teams have scored the same number of points, the ranking will be determined as follows:

During the group phase:

- a) higher goal difference in all matches;
- b) higher number of goals scored in all matches.

After completion of the group phase, if two teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of the two teams directly involved;
- b) goal difference in matches of the two teams directly involved;
- c) goal difference in all matches of the group;
- d) higher number of goals scored in all matches of the group.

After completion of the group phase, if three or more teams have scored the same number of points:

- a) number of points in matches of all teams directly involved;
- b) goal difference in matches of all teams directly involved;
- c) higher number of goals scored in matches of all teams directly involved;
- d) goal difference in all matches of the group;
- e) higher number of goals scored in all matches of the group;

If the ranking of one of these teams is determined, the criteria are consecutively followed until the ranking of all teams is determined.

If no ranking can be determined, a decision shall be obtained by drawing lots by the EHF, if possible, in the presence of a representative of each club.

QUARTER-FINALS

If, after completion of the two matches, both clubs have won the same number of points (no extra time will be played), the teams' standings shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) goal difference
- b) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Only players (incl. goalkeepers) who are listed on the match report and are not suspended or disqualified at the end of the playing time are entitled to participate at the penalty throws.

- Prior to the penalty throws, each team shall name five players by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws.

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the Game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may perform as goalkeepers.

- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If the scores are equal after the first round of penalty throws, it shall be continued until a decision is reached.

In the second round, the other team shall start. Again, five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).

- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.

- Serious infractions committed during penalty throws shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be supplementary named.

- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing court.

- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

WELL-KNOWN FACES TO CLASH IN GROUP A

Group A of the EHF European League Women 2023/24 brings exciting clashes of well-known faces in continental handball: EHF Champions League 2022/23 play-off participants Storhamar Handball Elite, EHF Finals 2023 runners-up Nykøbing Falster Håndbold, former EHF Champions League winners Podravka Vegeta, and one of the two teams that have been part of every EHF European League group phase so far, Praktiker-Vác. The Danish and Croatian clubs meet for the second season in a row and again are welcoming clubs from Norway and Hungary in their group, after their duels with Sola HK and DVSC Schaeffler last season.



The 2022/23 season marked Nykøbing's comeback to the European competition after a two-year hiatus and they wrote history by going all the way to the final, eventually losing to Ikast Handbold. Jakob Larsen's team were directly seeded to the group phase and, despite a much-changed squad, they still hold the same ambition – eying their second EHF Finals.

After one season in the EHF Champions League, Storhamar are ready to rock the EHF European League. In their third season in the second tier they are hoping to at least repeat their 2021/22 success, when they reached the quarter-finals. With minor changes but significant new signings, Kenneth Gabrielsen hopes his third season at the helm will be one to remember after eliminating H 65 Höörs HK in qualification.



Vác enter their fourth straight group phase after eliminating Kastamonu Belediyesi GSK in qualification. The young Hungarian team are hoping to make progress after finishing bottom of the group in each previous season and claiming only two victories. Gábor Herbert's team rely on strong back court players led by Csenge Kuczora.

Podravka are one of two Croatian representatives in the group phase, alongside Lokomotiva Zagreb. After being part of the second-tier competition last season as Croatian league runners-up, they return in that same role but led by a new head coach, Ivica Obrvan. The 1996 EHF Champions League winners dream of getting back among the best and are relying on an almost all-Croatian squad, that easily beat Swiss side Spono Eagles in the only qualification round Podravka had to play.

HC PODRAVKA VEGETA



Podravka Vegeta return to the EHF European League Women group phase as Croatian runners-up again. The club from Koprivnica saw the domestic title they used to win almost every year since the early 1990s go to Lokomotiva Zagreb for a second straight season.

With an almost all-Croatian squad, which underwent hardly any changes, Podravka now want to make progress in Europe. They jumped over the first hurdle with ease, beating Swiss side Spono Eagles twice during a double-header in the last qualification round in November.

- **start their second straight EL season with a new head coach: former HC PPD Zagreb player Ivica Obrvan**
- **have seven Croatia and two Austria national team players in the squad for 2023/24**
- **are one of two Croatian representatives in the group phase, alongside Lokomotiva Zagreb in group B**
- **are the only team in the group phase that won the EHF Champions League in the past – in 1996, in a final against Hypo Niederösterreich from Austria**
- **made only a few changes to the squad, as Josipa Mamic, Katarina Pandza and Tara Delekovčan are the only new arrivals to the team for 2023/24**

Podravka recorded six straight defeats in the second-tier competition last season. Under new coach Ivica Obrvan, who is leading a women’s team for the first time, they certainly want to do better. Obrvan was also appointed as head coach of the Croatia national team after the departure of Nenad Sostaric, and with a range of internationals in Podravka’s squad, he gets a good insight in the national team.

“Our team is young and full of potential but needs time to grow,” Obrvan said. “The players are working hard and are getting better in every game. I believe that we will be at an optimal level in January. I hope we achieve all the expectations of our club, and we hope to make a step further in the competition.”

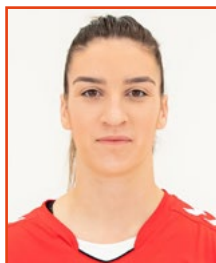

GROUP B PREVIEW

EXPERIENCE AND YOUTH COLLIDE IN GROUP B



Four sides which have already featured in the groups of European competitions in the past years – including the EHF European League Women – will clash with the sole aim of progressing to the quarter-finals. There is no clear favourite in group B, but last year's EHF Finals alumni Thüringer HC will be aiming to create a path to return to the business end of the second-tier European competition.



The German side has kept the core of the team intact, with plenty of experience coming from centre back Sonja Frey, while coach Herbert Müller will try to produce some magic again, as he is the longest-tenured coach in the competition, having been on THC's bench for the past 14 years. On the other hand, the German side will have a lofty challenge this year too, albeit the composition of the group brings some memories from the past season, when THC also met a Romanian side and a French team on their way to the EHF Finals, where they ended up on the fourth place.

HC Dunarea Braila, an ambitious side, are led by an experienced coach, Jan Leslie. Braila are also making their comeback to the group phase of the EHF European League Women after a two-year hiatus, but will play their home matches in Buzau, 100 kilometres away from their home court. With an experienced squad, led by backs Kristina Liscevic, Mireya Gonzalez and Jelena Zivkovic, Braila will be aiming to progress to the quarter-finals.



After a 60:47 aggregate win in the final qualification round against Czech side DHK Banik Most, Chambrey Touraine are back in the group phase of the EHF European League after a one-year hiatus, and have an interesting mix of experience, with backs Laura van der Heijden and Jovana Stojkovic in the squad, and youth exuberance, as plenty of young French players are trying to make their mark.



Last, but not least, Lokomotiva Zagreb will make their comeback to the EHF European League Women, after featuring last season in the EHF Champions League Women, where they drew one match and lost 13 in the group phase. The Croatian side will try to use that experience, albeit featuring a very young team, the youngest between the 16 sides in the second-tier European competition, to try and spring some surprises here and there. Lokomotiva also underwent a coaching change. After Nenad Sostaric moved to RK Zagreb, his former assistant, Vedran Krkac, took over the reins and has started leading the team, trying to use the path created by the former coach.

THÜRINGER HC



For the third time in the past four seasons, Thüringer HC made the cut for the group phase of the EHF European League Women, as the German side is one of the most consistent teams in the second-tier European competition in the past years. In the 2020/21 season, THC did not make it from the group phase, while one year later, they were eliminated in qualification by a narrow one-goal loss against Molde Elite.

However, last season, Thüringer had one of their best-ever seasons in European competitions, reaching the EHF Finals Women, where they

- are one of the most experienced teams in the competition, with players like Sonja Frey, Lydia Jakubisova and Kerstin Kündig
- have played 16 EL matches so far, winning six, drawing two and losing eight
- are led by Herbert Müller, the longest-tenured coach in the group phase this season who has spent the last 13 years on the bench for the German side
- had Austrian centre back Sonja Frey as their top scorer in the past two EL seasons, with 70 goals combined
- have nine nationalities from two continents represented in their roster for the 2023/24 season

finished fourth, conceding losses against Ikast Handbold – the eventual winners – and BV Borussia 09 Dortmund in the third place match.

More of the same is expected from the German side, as they rely on consistency. Head coach Herbert Müller, who has been appointed in 2010, will be leading the team once again in this season. With experienced players like Sonja Frey, Lydia Jakubisova and Kerstin Kündig in the roster, THC will be aiming once again for some excellent performances, but their start of the season in the German Bundesliga has been a mixed bag of results.

For the first time in the past three seasons, HC Dunarea Braila are part of the group phase of the EHF European League Women, with newfound ambition, as the Romanian team aims high this season.

Indeed, Braila built a strong side in the past seasons, with nine nationalities from three different continents represented in the squad. They also underwent a coaching change in September, when experienced Danish coach Jan Leslie took over from Costica Buceschi.

- have nine nationalities – Romanian, Angolan, Brazilian, Russian, Belarussian, Serbian, Croatian, Spanish, and German – represented in their roster

The Romanian side impressed with a 25:24 win on the German side's court, before the second leg to confirmed them sealing a group matches berth, with the 27:22 win setting them up for a 52:46 aggregate win.

Braila have plenty of experience in their roster, with the bronze medallist from the EHF EURO 2020, Croatia captain Katarina Jezic, leading the defence. Moreover, centre back Kristina Liscevic and right back Mireya Gonzalez Alvarez will return to the groups of a European competition after a few seasons' absence.

HC LOKOMOTIVA ZAGREB



The Croatian side are returning to the second-tier European club competition, after they featured last season in the EHF Champions League Women group phase.

Changes have happened since then, with coach Nenad Sostaric moving over to the men's team of HC Zagreb, while Lokomotiva have been taken over by young coach Vedran Krkac. Once again, Lokomotiva are relying on young and talented players, with none of the players in their roster being aged 30 years or older.

- replaced coach Nenad Sostaric, who left after seven years in charge, with Vedran Krkac
- won the Croatian domestic title in the past two seasons
- failed to make it out of the group phase in the CL 2022/23 and the EL 2021/22
- are the youngest side in the competition, with an average age of 20.5 years
- lost all their matches in the group two seasons ago, as they are on a 20-game winless run in the groups of European competitions

In fact, they are the youngest team in the EHF European League this season, with an average age of 20.5 years, as that lack of experience might prove crucial at times in such a well-balanced group.

Reaching the group phase this season was a matter of a clear 53:43 aggregate win for Vedran Krkac's side, with Lokomotiva delivering an excellent performance against Swiss side LC Brühl Handball in the last qualification round to clinch a place between the top 16 teams.

Team captain Tena Japundza says Lokomotiva are “motivated to prove our worth, and show what we have been working on. Now that we have secured the group phase, we have got to show we belong there.”

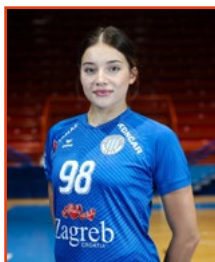

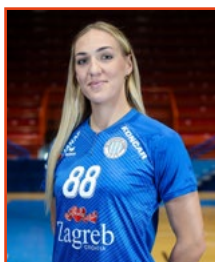

In the 2021/22 season, Chambray Touraine HB were eliminated after the group phase, winning a single match, drawing another one and conceding four losses; an experience which surely acted as a wake-up call for the French side.

FORMER CHAMPIONS TO CHALLENGE IN BALANCED GROUP

One of the hardest groups to predict in this season's EHF European League contains the inaugural winners of the competition in 2021, Neptunes Nantes, and three teams that are more than capable of navigating their way into the quarter-finals as well: CS Gloria 2018, MKS FunFloor Lublin, and HSG Bensheim/Auerbach. Only two of them will actually advance...



Neptunes Nantes, winners of the first edition in 2021, came up just short of another EHF Finals appearance last season, when they went down in the quarter-finals against BV Borussia 09 Dortmund in one of the biggest upsets of the year: Having won the first leg by nine goals (28:19) at home, they lost the return in Germany by 10 (32:22). Nantes are eager to have another go this season, but even with players like Carin Stromberg and Jessica Ryde, they first must make sure to advance from the group phase.

Romanian side Gloria have built themselves a team able to perform in what is only the club's second ever European campaign. Last time around, in 2020, the club from Bistrita reached the EHF Cup quarter-finals, and a similar performance seems within reach this time.



Lublin have a much bigger European record, with two trophies on the shelf. But this season is only their first since 2020/21 in which they managed to qualify for the EHF European League group phase. With a new coach and a couple of Polish top-level players returning to the club, Lublin will surely be a tough opponent for the other teams in the group.

Bensheim/Auerbach might be newcomers in European competitions, but that could also be what makes them dangerous as the unknown team. Also, a look at their squad reveals the potential strength of Bensheim/Auerbach, with experienced players and new bright talents. While some might regard it as a surprise if they were to make the quarter-finals, it arguably wouldn't really be one.

Four seasons after a first European experience that led them to the quarter-finals of the EHF Cup, CS Gloria 2018 BN are back – and back with ambitions: “We want to reach the EHF Finals,” says manager Cosma Vasile Eugen.

Gloria have signed a couple of experienced players, such as EHF EURO 2018 winner Gnonsiane Niombla and recent EHF EURO bronze medallist Nina Bulatovic, joining a roster that includes Romanian talents like Yuliya Dumanska, Nicoleta Dinca, and Bianca Bazalciu.

- **have not played in a European club competition since their international debut in 2019/20**
- **reached the quarter-final of the EHF Cup in their only previous European season, losing to Danish side Ikast Håndbold – the current European League champions**
- **finished third in the Romanian league and reached the semi-finals of the domestic cup last season**

Even though Gloria are rediscovering European handball, the Romanian side expects to be as successful as Rapid Bucuresti and CSM Bucuresti are in the EHF Champions League. But immediate success is not the only thing on the cards. “Playing the EHF European League is really important for our club, especially because our handball team is a role model for our young teams,” adds manager Cosma Vasile Eugen.

Competition in group C looks fierce, with three opponents that also have the potential to advance to the quarter-finals. Gloria captain Cristina Laslo is awaiting one group match in particular: “Back in 2020/21, I was playing for CS Minaur Baia Mare and we lost the EHF European League final against Neptunes de Nantes, so I’m really looking forward to the game against them.”

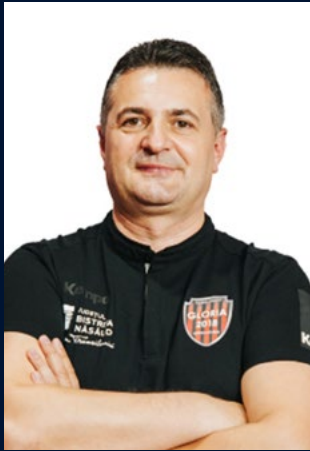

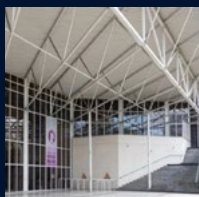

After winning the inaugural EHF Finals in 2021, Neptunes Nantes are ready to fight for the title again. While their campaign ended in the quarter-finals last season, the French side return again with a team that places them among the favourites of the competition.

Danish head coach Helle Thomsen, in charge since 2022, has gathered some of the finest talents from Scandinavia, with goalkeeper Jessica Ryde and back Helene Fauske joining the likes of Anna Lagerquist, Carin Strömberg and Mari Finstad Bergum.

But also the team's French core is strong, highlighted by the signing of Tamara Horacek, who played at the EHF FINAL4 with Metz Handball in the past. The international wants to help Nantes go as far as possible in the EHF European League: "My biggest motivation is to reach the EHF Finals with this great team. We are working for this every day."

The chemistry between the players is present, as the French club showed in the final qualification round, when they easily got past Molde Elite, beating the former club of coach Thomsen 75:52 on aggregate. But the competition in group C is fierce, with CS Gloria 2018 BN, MKS FunFloor Lublin, and ambitious newcomer HSG Bensheim/Auerbach. "The games against Gloria are the most exciting, because I think we will fight for the first spot against them. But I know that in order to reach the EHF Finals, we need to play good handball all the time," Horacek says.

In their fourth season in the EHF European League, MKS FunFloor Lublin are aiming for something they have not done before: reaching the quarter-finals. Two times, including last season against Siófok, their journey ended in the qualification phase, while once they did make it to the group phase, but no further. After easily beating Zork Jagodina in the last qualification round, Lublin are ready for a new adventure.

With Edyta Majdzinska, three times named best coach of the Polish league, on the bench, Lublin are set to meet three strong opponents.

We want to be able to make quick fast breaks thanks to our defence and I think we are well prepared to play against the best teams,” adds the captain, who is aware that good handball is crucial for Lublin, who have won two European trophies in the past – most recently the Challenge Cup in 2018.

STRONG TEAMS MAKE FOR AN UNPREDICTABLE GROUP



Group D promises to be one of the most exciting in Europe's second-tier club competition as it features ever-improving Mosonmagyaróvári KC, former EHF European Cup winners Costa del Sol Malaga, all-out attacking Sola HK, and debutants CSM Targu Jiu. With no clear favourite in sight and four attack-minded squads, goals will flow all over Europe, from Hungary to Spain, from Norway to Romania.



Mosonmagyaróvár missed out on a place in the quarter-finals last season, but the Hungarian club – playing their third consecutive season in the EHF European League group phase – look stronger than ever. In the domestic league, they have been fully keeping up with powerhouses Györi Audi ETO KC and FTC-Rail Cargo Hungaria in the first part of the season, and now are eager to carry their convincing form into Europe.

Malaga are one of two newcomers to the competition in group D. The Spanish side secured a place in the group phase after defeating Scandinavian duo Larvik HK and København Håndbold in the qualification rounds, which is a strong statement about their quality and determination to be among the best 16 teams in the competition. Their performances were epitomised by a passionate and super-attacking approach, especially in front of their home fans. Malaga enter the group phase on the back of their first-ever title in the Spanish League.



Quarter-finalists in the previous two seasons, Sola are eager to go at least another step further this season. Experienced veteran and team captain Camilla Herrem is still the heart of the squad, as the 37-year-old spearheaded the team's attack in the final qualification round against Super Amara Bera Bera, a tie the Norwegian club won by a single goal. Sola are the most experienced team in group D when it comes to playing in European competitions.



Targu Jiu, on the contrary, have no experience at all: making their debut in any European club competition, the Romanian side is motivated to leave its mark this season. Targu Jiu have already demonstrated their skills in qualification, where defeated Önnareds HK twice. Additionally, Targu Jiu's squad is made up by experienced players like Ekaterina Dzhukeva as well as Laura Petruta Moldovan among others, and though their start to the domestic season in Romania has been disappointing, they are ready to leave a positive impression in their first-ever European season.

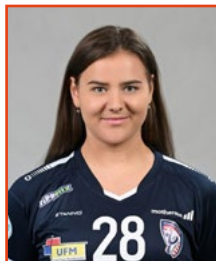

COSTA DEL SOL MALAGA



After winning the EHF European Cup in 2020/21 and making it to the final of the same competition again the following season, Costa del Sol Malaga are ready for the next level. They enter the group phase of the EHF European League for the first time, after falling at the qualification phase a year ago.

However, that European disappointment was followed by a great domestic season, as Malaga landed the Spanish league title for the first time in the club's history in 2023.

- reached their first EL group phase at the second attempt, after failing in qualification in 2022/23
- had to beat two internationally respected clubs in qualification this time: first Larvik (68:58 on aggregate), then København (54:49 on aggregate)

"Playing the group phase was a dream that seemed impossible just a few years ago. We cannot describe this feeling. We have fought a lot to get here and now we want to enjoy all about this beautiful experience. This club has no defined limits and we want much more."

Malaga have passed the first tests of their European season, as the club overcame the challenging task of beating clubs like Larvik HK and København Håndbold in the qualification rounds.

Sola HK have come close to the EHF Finals Women in the last two seasons, but both times missed the last step and went out in the quarter-finals. So, their aim for 2023/24 is clear: not only advancing from the group phase again, but then also from the quarter-finals.

Speaking about ‘close’, Sola only just made it into the group phase this time. In the final qualification round, they beat Super Amara Bera Bera by seven goals at home (39:32), only to lose the return game in Spain by six (34:28), hence advancing by the smallest of aggregate margins; 67:66.

- are returning to the EHF European League group phase for the third straight season
- reached the quarter-finals but failed to make the EHF Finals on both previous occasions, losing to Baia Mare (2021/22) and THC (2022/23), respectively
- lost Norwegian cup final against Vipers in 2023
- rely on star player and team captain Camilla Herrem to guide their all-Norwegian squad, 60 per cent of which consists of young talents from the Rogaland region
- only just managed to advance to the 2023/24 group phase, beating Super Amara Bera Bera from Spain by a single goal over two duels in qualification

The core of Sola HK’s squad remains based around experienced captain and club icon Camilla Herrem, who is looking forward to get out of her comfort zone again and take a peek into the unknown to play against new sides: “My biggest motivation is playing against clubs that we usually don’t meet and play against, so it’s going to be fun preparing for the teams,” the Norwegian international says.

A special match for Herrem is the one against CSM Targu Jiu: “I am looking forward to playing in Romania again, because I know the spectators are making so much noise and I love that,” says Herrem, who spent one season of her illustrious career with Baia Mare in Romania. “I think it is an open group and we have to be on top every game if we want to have a chance to go to the quarter-finals.”
